THE

The definite article
the is used to refer to
something specific,
unique or previously
mentioned.

The can be used before singular or plural nouns.

Ex: **The** car I want is for sale.

Ex: **The** apples she bought were delicious.

The is used with count and non count nouns.

Ex: Pass me <u>the</u> salt, please Ex: I bought <u>the</u> gifts.

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A/AN

Indefinite articles

a/an are used to refer

to a noun that is not

specific or to a

particular member of

a group or class.

<u>A/an</u> are used only for singular nouns.

Ex: I saw <u>a</u> car for sale.

Ex: She bought <u>an</u> apple.

A/an are used only with count nouns.

Ex: I have <u>a</u> sister and <u>a</u> brother.

Ex: She wrote <u>an</u> inspirational speech.

A is used when the following word begins with a consonant or u/eu.

An is used when the word starts with a vowel sound.
