(2) Provide an introduction that includes information on the author(s), scope of research, and/or the source.

## **Format Rules**

- Follow the format established in the rest of your paper (1 inch margin, capitalized running head and page number).
- Font and size: Time New Roman 12pt.
- It should be double-spaced.
- Put Annotated Bibliography centered.
- Use a hanging indentation after your first line (continue until the end of your annotations).

(2) The authors, researchers at the Rand Corporation and Brown University, use data from the National Longitudinal Surveys of Young Women and Young Men to test their hypothesis that nonfamily living by young adults alters their attitudes, values, plans, and expectations, moving them away from their belief in traditional sex roles. (3) They find their hypothesis strongly supported in young females, while the effects were fewer in studies of young males. Increasing the time away from parents before marrying increased individualism, self-sufficiency, and changes in attitudes about families. In contrast, an earlier study by Williams cited below shows no significant gender differences in sex role attitudes as a result of nonfamily living.

## **Relevant Information**

The selection of information will depend on your instructor's requirements. In APA format, the annotations are similar to summaries. Things to keep in mind:

- Main arguments.
- The source's strengths & weaknesses.
- The results.
- An evaluation of the research methodology (if applicable).
- Information about the author's background.
